## **NAAC** Peer Team Reports

The Peer Team recommends the following for the development of the College

- i. More teachers should go for faculty improvement and M.Phil. and Ph.D. programmes.
- ii. Computer use must become universal on campus in all teaching, research and administration.
- The library hours may be suitably altered so that the campus community may have access to the library and Internet search facilities between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. (in shifts) regularly, and not just during February and March (annual exam preparation time). The library should be open on Saturdays and Sundays at least for six hours each day. The library staff's working time may be adjusted accordingly.
- The library must acquire more books. For a College that was started in 1975 and expanded in 1982, there should be at least 50,000 books and computer search facilities in its central library.
- Besides the computers in the College Office and library, there should be computers in each department besides at least 50 computers in the computer centre so that all students and staff may have access to the computer. Moreover, teachers must insist that students turn in their assignments regularly preparing them on the computer.
- Teachers must give at least a dozen assignments to students every year in addition to class tests, pop quizzes, mid-term tests and practice tests before every final university exam. This practice must be started without any delay so that before it becomes autonomous, the college can get practice in academic autonomy through properly designed internal assessment systems.
- vii. There should be a more active grievance redressal cell which will handle complaints from students, teachers and parents in a systematic manner. Suggestion / Grievance Boxes may be installed in different locations on campus, particularly in the students' common room (Waiting Halls), teachers' room, and near the Principal's Office and Hostel Wardens' Offices



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In order to encourage the students in their academic and extra-curricular activities, social organizations, citizens and members of staff have instituted a number of each prizes, shields and other incentives.

The Alumni Association of the College is very active. Many students of the College have won gold medals and ranks at post graduation and other levels. Some of the alumni are holding prominent positions in government and private sectors. One of them was elected member of the legislative assembly, and another won the Bharat Udyog Rama Award from the government of India. The Alumni Association participates in all activities and programmes of the College. Its contribution to the College and society in general is great.

The members of the association expressed their willingness to contribute generously for starting new courses in the college; one prominent member promised to meet up to 50% of the expenses incurred for the establishment of the new courses.

The College has a procedure of collecting feedback on regular courses, teachers, programmes, etc from the students regularly. The staff members and Principal obtain regular feedback on teaching and learning from the students through personal interactions. A Students' Cumulative Record could be maintained from the time when the student is admitted till he leaves the College. This will help in monitoring the progress of the student.

Recreational facilities in the form of indoor and outdoor games, student magazines, cultural programmes, competitions like essay writing, debate, music and dance are made available to the students. This helps in the all round development of the students.



Books are issued to the students and staff of neighboring institutions on recommendation of the Principal. Meritorious students from each class are provided with additional books. There is an advisory committee for the library. The library is open from Monday to Saturday for 8 hours in the first term and 11 hours in the second term. The students can be encouraged by competitions to inculcate reading habit among the students. An open access system of books may be made available to the students for better usage of library. The library has two computers, Audio and Video cassettes.

The College has a well-equipped and moderately furnished independent central computer laboratory with 14 systems having state-of-the-art configurations. Students from various courses use the computers under the watchful eyes of a well-qualified and experienced staff. However, when the College extended the facility of computer learning to other desirous students also, only 16 students have availed themselves of this facility. Efforts are to be taken to motivate more students to learn the basics of computer use. Open from 8.30 am to 5.00 pm on Sundays and holidays on request from students and riaff, the computer lab has Internet facility.

The College has good infrastructure for indoor and outdoor games along with a 400-meter track for athletics to promote students' sports skills. The sports department is equipped with sufficient equipment. Good incentives are given to the sportspersons. A number of students from the College have represented in Interuniversity tournaments and have been awarded University Blues. A Gymnasium could be started to promote good health of students and staff in the College.

The Kamataka University Athletic Meet was organized in the college during 2002.

The College has provided independent hostel for boys and girls to help the

Summent feedback is an important element for assessing the quality of teaching. In the year 2003, the College organized a workshop for the BBA Colleges of Bijapur and Bagaillot districts.

The teachers conduct monthly tests, tutorials and seminars regularly. Guest lectures are arranged on selected topics for the benefit of the students normally in the month of January and February. The College has a spacious, partially computerized and well-furnished library with 20,825 books and 13 professional journals and general periodicals which help update the learning process.

At the beginning of the session every year, the teachers prepare a teaching plan and unitization of syllabus. The HOD monitors the process of teaching and learning in the respective departments.

Attempts are to be made to enhance student-enrollment in the BCA course.

### CRETERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

The efforts made by the College in the field of research are really encouraging. Four members of the staff have been awarded Ph.D., two are M.Phil and three have registered for Ph.D. out of a staff of 13 permanent teachers. One minor project funded by UGC is undertaken by one of the teachers. Four staff members have written textbooks and reference books on different subjects.

The project works of BBA students are guided by the teachers. Various activities conducted by the College under extension activities include community development, health and hygienic awareness, adult education and literacy, blood donation camps, AIDS awareness programmes etc. The NSS units of the College have conducted the programmes to create social awareness regarding the ill effects of AIDS and the Davadusi system. Some of the teachers are engaged in the consultancy services with

Karnataka University. Taking into consideration the demand from society, the College started new generation courses such as BBA and BCA recently.

There is a need for starting the Science Faculty in the College.

### CRITERION II: TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION.

There are 180 teaching days in the College. Students are given prior information regarding the methods of evaluation, passing standards and internal tests etc. Since there is a restriction on the appointment of new teachers by the Government of Karnataka, management has appointed temporary teachers.

Barbani (Karasaka)

The College has sports facilities and a parent teacher association, and its students have evinced keen interest in winning creditable positions in curricular and extracurricular competitions conducted at the university level. Its library has 20825 books and 13 journals and periodicals in its collection. Its computer facility includes 13 PCs, 4 printers, essential hardware and software.

The College is well aware of its strengths and weaknesses. Strengths include well-qualified and experienced teachers, an adequate and well-equipped campus with sufficient number of buildings for the programmes offered by the College. However, there are weaknesses as pointed out by the College itself, prominent among which are the tack of personnel and systems to organize campus recruitment and placement, absence of internet facilities and research and extension activities.

Some of the healthy practices are given below:

- The scheme called, "Read a journal and carn a pen" encourages the reading of

- Computer learning facility has been offered to all students at a nominal rate.
- An "Earn while you learn" programme is supporting a few needy students. .

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- procedures. Copies of which may be given to all members of the campus community. The Principal may ensure that decisions of the Grievance Cell are fair and just and that they are conveyed to the aggrieved parties in writing. Decisions affecting the whole campus must be shared with all members of the campus community through wall notices or special bulletins.
- ix. Students winning first, second and third places in intra-College, inter-collegiate and university sports and games events must be given cash awards and other prizes. Facilities for all sports and games must be provided, especially for girls who show great potential, since girls generally lag behind in many activities.
- Arts and cultural talents must be promoted in the College so that students get an opportunity to develop their personality and become more confident in placing public challenges. Special encouragement should be given to those who show outstanding merit.
- In addition to the facilities for medical checkup now available accident insurance has to be provided to all students and staff on campus.
- xii. There should be a College Academic Committee under the Principal to devise new course offerings, particularly job-oriented courses. Interactions with industrial and business firms in the Bagalkot district and nearby districts including the capital city of Bangalore will ensure that the College course offerings will be highly useful to the employment of students in various positions.
- xiii. Participation by students in national tests such as NET / SET etc., and in civil service exams must be encouraged. There should be an Employment Guidance Cell in the College that can advise senior students on various national, state and even international job placement possibilities. Since the College is situated in a semi-urban environment and its students are mostly rural, such a service will be of considerable help to them.
- from major industries and other institutions for senior students in the first quarter of the last year of their study. This will enable rural students to learn more about their country and its infinite variety.

The management of the Banhatti Spinning Mills is rendering great service to the college, the Chairman of the JSS is a director of the Spinning Mills and other directors are also taking great interest in the progress of the college.

There is an inbuilt mechanism to check the work efficiency of the non-teaching staff. Internal checking, physical verification of stock, confidential reports, movement registers are some measures taken to increase efficiency. Professional development programmes are made available to non-teaching staff which include computer training, training in office management etc. Workshops could be arranged for the non-teaching staff to train them for smooth and effective administration.

Loans are made available through Employees Credit Cooperative Society.

Selecting representatives purely on the basis of academic performance is the principle behind the Students' Council. The Principal and the departments of heads have a good internal coordinating and monitoring mechanism. The important activities of the College are planned, coordinated and monitored by the Governing Body under the able guidance of the Janata Shikshan Sangh.

#### CRITERION VII: HEALTHY PRACTICES

About three decades ago, there was no facility for commerce education in Banhatti. The JSS took the initiative to remove this drawback by establishing a College of Commerce in 1975, to which was added the Faculty of Arts in 1982, along with four undergraduate programme options offered through 14 departments. The College has a National Service Scheme (NSS) Unit that undertakes various activities especially in the motal areas where camps are organized.

The MSS unit also looks after the promotion of civic responsibilities among the

Annual College Magazine could be published to give students an opportunity to show their hidden creative talents. Yoga classes could also be started for the benefit of the students.

The College provides a proper platform to recognize and encourage the extracurricular skills of the students. For this, various associations have been formed to enter to the various interests of the students.

The department of the BBA arranged campus interviews in November 2004, the college also organized a UGC-sponsored state-level seminar on Banking and Insurance for teachers.

There is a need for a gymnasium.

Provision for hostel facility for 20 boys and 20 girls has been made, but it is inadequate as neither hostel has facilities like boarding, proper kitchen, fans in the rooms and lights in the passages.

## CRITERION VI - ORGANIZATION AND MANAGEMENT

Organization and Management are two extremely important elements of the College, which help it to prosper and function smoothly. The Janata Shikshan Sangh, devoted to the noble cause of education, takes an active interest in the overall development of the College. It has constituted a College Advisory Committee with Chairman, Secretary and members.

There is an Office Superintendent to monitor the office work, while the centralized office of Janata Shikshan Sangh coordinates different activities of the College. There are various committees to monitor the routine activities of the College. A special committee is set up to prepare the academic calendar. Major items of the College are purchased after decisions taken by Management.

After careful scrutiny of the Self Study Report the Peer Team during its institutional visit had a direct interaction with the Management, Faculty, staff, students, parents and alumni and examined various records maintained by the College besides the inspection of its physical infrastructure. Based on this, the Peer Team has formulated its views on the strengths and areas of concern on the established set of seven criteria as follows:

### CRITERION 1: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

There are six departments for social science namely Political Science,

Economics, Statistics, Sociology, Geography and History. Under the Faculty of

Commerce there are options for three languages. The combinations given in the

Commerce faculty are commerce and accountancy, conomics, statistics and computer

Applications. Other programmes offered are BBA and BCA. Thus there is enough facility

for programme options for the students. B.Com students have computer application in

Business as vocational subject funded by the UGC.

Since the College is affiliated to the Karnataka University, the syllabus followed is of that university. Annual system is followed for B.A., and B.Com courses while semester system is followed for BBA and BCA courses. It is praiseworthy that vocational subjects are also added to the B.A. programme. The students of B.Com. are given chances to work for CA and ICWA courses.

The College tries to translate its goals and objectives by giving practical training and also by adding programmes related to personality development and career development. The College has signed an MOU with a cooperative spinning mill in Danhatti. Students are also given inplant training with local SSI units.

There is no NCC unit in the college; starting of it will be most desirable.

### CRITERION IV - INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The College is situated in a semi-urban area, with a campus area of 23 acres. It has an attractive building located in a clean, beautiful campus with trees. The infrastructure available in the campus include various departments, classrooms, library, computer centre, sports facilities, two hostels, a canteen, two vehicle parking sheds and an open air theatre.

The College has an adequate number of well-equipped classrooms for academic activities. The optimum utilization of infrastructure is being done to run various regular and self financing courses. However, a new multipurpose hall or auditorium would be greatly helpful in promoting academic and non academic activities of the College.

The College has a spacious, well-furnished and well-equipped Library in a separate building. The library is computerized and can accommodate a maximum of 70 students at a time. It has 20,825 books on various subjects. Journals, periodicals and fending dailies in Kannada and English are made available to the students. Thirteen journals and periodicals are being subscribed to. Under the 'Book Bank' schenic, 6-7 books are issued to each student.

The College has a canteen inside the campus for students and staff. It provides refreshments at reasonable rates. A Committee may be set up to oversee the smooth functioning of canteen activities.

Pure, filtered drinking water is made available to the students. A doctor conducts regular medical checkup of the staff and students.

The Student Welfare Department has to be strengthened. Welfare facilities such as Accident Insurance may be provided to the students.

A Women's Cell would be helpful for students and staff. It could be set up under the guidance of a female teacher and it can organize programmes to encourage the littlen talents and skills of the girls.

## CRETERION V - STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The College gives constant support to promote and ensure the all round development of its students. The percentage of students appearing for the qualifying examination is high and the dropout rate is low.

At the time of admission, the students are given an updated prospectus giving details about courses, subject combinations, fee structure, scholarships, cash prizes and various rules, regulations, etc. Various State and Central Govt. Scholarships are made available for the students.

There is no formal employment cell or placement officer; however, the professor in charge of SWO looks after career counselling and guidance. There is an SC/ST cell for the guidance of SC/ST students. There is also a grievance redressal cell in the College which helps to settle the grievances with the consultation of Principal. Teachers participate in academic and personal counselling for academic improvement of the students.

Two teachers of the institution are recognized Ph.D. guides of the affiliating University. The number of publications with ISBN from the institution has significantly increased from the earlier assessment period. Significant number of books have been published by some teachers. History department participated in excavations that resulted in significant archaeological finds.
